#### **SUMMARY STATEMENT:**

This Emergency Ordinance would allow for an extension of the continuation of the current moratorium already in effect within the City to September 30, 2009, unless earlier terminated by Council action. It is expected by City staff that the required update of the Comprehensive Plan and accompanying development regulations shall be completed by that date.

Continuation of the moratorium is necessary to avoid severely compromising or entirely negating the goals of the City's updated Comprehensive Plan.

COMMITTEE REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATION: Recommend Council approval.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: MOTION to adopt Ordinance 09-894, continuing a moratorium on the landing of mobile homes or manufactured homes within the City.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 09-894**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BLACK DIAMOND, KING COUNTY, WASHINGTON, PLACING A TEMPORARY PROHIBITION ON THE LANDING OF MOBILE HOMES OR MANUFACTURED HOMES, EXCEPT WITHIN PREVIOUSLY APPROVED AND EXISTING MOBILE HOME PARK SITES AND UPON COMMERCIALLY ZONED PROPERTY AND EXCEPT THE PLACMENENT OF NEW MANUFACTURED HOMES WITHIN THE CITY AND DECLARING THIS ORDINANCE A PUBLIC EMERGENCY ORDINANCE AND THUS EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY

WHEREAS, the City Council makes the following findings:

- 1. Statistics previously compiled by the City indicate that Black Diamond contains an inordinate number of manufactured housing units in relation to the population of the City.
- 2. The current facilities for manufactured housing and mobile homes in existing mobile home parks within the City may continue to operate under passage of this ordinance.
- 3. For over twelve years the City has been working toward the goal of bringing into reality a vision for the development of Black Diamond that will make the City a model city demonstrating excellent small City comprehensive urban land planning and development.
- 4. The City has this opportunity because a vast percentage of the total land area within the City is undeveloped and is in the control of only two entities.
- 5. One of those entities has provided the funding, through various agreements, to hire the consultants and expert staff to complete the changes to the City's Comprehensive Plan and development regulations that are necessary to bring the City's vision into reality.
- 6. In order to expedite the completion of the necessary Comprehensive Plan and development regulations the City Council and Planning Commission have been holding additional meetings.
- 7. Since the City has many undeveloped or underdeveloped parcels allowing development to occur before the new development regulations are in place would result in the vision of the City that is contained in the Comprehensive Plan being severely compromised, if not thwarted.
- 8. The development regulations that are being developed include increased standards for the protections for critical wildlife habitat, environmentally sensitive areas, and areas that are critical for the protection of water quality for endangered species.

#### **EMERGENCY ORDINANCE**

- 9. It would be detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare to allow large portions of the City to vest to the old development standards until such time as the new development regulations are adopted by the City, as development applications might vest to the old standards unless the premature filing of applications is prevented.
- 10. It is anticipated, given the current work plan and increased number of public meetings, that the implementation regulations will be completed within six months.
- 11. Pursuant to RCW 35A.63.220 a public hearing was held on March 5, 2009 regarding the continuation of the existing moratorium that is in effect as a result of the adoption of ordinance 08-869.

Based upon the above findings,

# THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLACK DIAMOND, KING COUNTY, WASHINGTON DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1</u>. The moratorium previously imposed under Ordinance 08-869 shall be and hereby is extended. The moratorium prohibits the landing of manufactured homes or mobile homes, as defined in RCW 46.04.302, and the acceptance of applications for the landing of manufactured homes or mobile homes, except as otherwise authorized in Section 2.

- Section 2. The moratorium as provided in Section 1 above shall not include modular homes as defined in RCW 46.04.303, and shall not include the placement of new manufactured homes pursuant to BDMC 18.56.070. Additionally, any mobile home legally landed within the City prior to June 15, 1994, may be replaced by the owner but only so long as the replacement mobile home is a minimum of 28 feet in width and 40 feet in length and is a 1986 model year or newer. In addition, the replacement mobile home must meet all other provisions governing mobile homes as contained in the Black Diamond Municipal Code. During the period of this moratorium, mobile and manufactured homes may still be placed on existing approved mobile home sites in existing mobile home parks within the City or upon properties zoned community retail, light industrial or industrial, where the mobile or manufactured home is used exclusively for commercial purposes and upon a grant of a conditional use permit.
- <u>Section 3</u>. The prohibition set forth in Section 1 shall be effective until **September 30**, **2009**, unless earlier terminated by action of the City Council.
- <u>Section 4</u>. This Ordinance is hereby designated as a Public Emergency Ordinance necessary for the protection of public health, safety, public property or the public peace and shall be effective upon adoption.
- <u>Section 5</u>. Each and every provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed severable. If any provision of this Ordinance should be deemed to be unconstitutional or otherwise contrary to the law by a Court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections so long as the intent of the Ordinance can be fulfilled without the illegal section.

#### **SUMMARY STATEMENT:**

Dear Seth:

PacWest Engineering is pleased to submit this proposal to provide Civil Engineering services to the City of Black Diamond in support of the Reimbursement Agreement with Nestle. It is our understanding that the agreement is being extended through June 2009 and the City would like to include a scope for our services into the agreement extension. This proposal has been developed based on our conversations with City staff, as well as our familiarity with your community.

#### **SCOPE OF SERVICES**

The following are included in the scope of services to be provided for completion of this project:

#### Task 101 - Project Management and Coordination

PacWest Engineering will provide general project management services. This phase includes overall project coordination services.

#### <u>Task 102 – Rate Impact Analysis</u>

PacWest Engineering will evaluate the proposed water usage of the Nestle Bottling plant in association with the water rates that were recently adopted. We will evaluate the proposed revenues to be collected from the Nestle Bottling plant, for the first six years of plant operation (assuming the plant goes online in 2010). We will also evaluate increased O&M costs for the City water utility as a result of the proposed Nestle Bottling Plant (i.e. increased testing requirements associated with the use of Tacoma Intertie water). We will consider the increased costs associated with the resulting use of Tacoma Water and calculate the net benefit for the City.

#### Task 103 –Water System Impact Analysis

PacWest Engineering will support the City in determining the impacts that the Nestle Bottling Plant may have on the City's water system. Specific items of work to be completed for this task are as follows:

#### **Tacoma Water Impact Analysis**

PacWest Engineering understands that Nestle desires to construct a waterline directly from the springs to their proposed bottling plant location. The addition of this high water usage customer to the City system will most likely require that the City of Black Diamond begin using Tacoma Water via the recently constructed intertie. We further understand that there are operational issues associated with the Tacoma Water that need to be identified and resolved prior to commencement of its use.

PacWest Engineering will evaluate usage of the Tacoma Water and provide recommendations for how best to address any concerns. Specific issues to be investigated include such topics as fluoridation, contact time requirements, etc. 5009 Pacific Highway E, Unit 9-0

#### Meetings

Leonard L. Smith, PE/PLS will attend one coordination meeting a month for the time period of March 2009 through June 2009. He will also attend two meetings with City Council during this timeframe.

#### Water Modeling

We understand that the City will handle most water line routing issues related to the City's comprehensive plan. PacWest Engineering will support the City by completing any necessary water system modeling.

#### Task 104 –AC & Small Line Waterline Replacement Estimates

PacWest Engineering will prepare cost estimates for the replacement of all Asbestos Cement waterlines that are approaching their useful life. We will also prepare cost estimates for small diameter (less than 6") waterlines. These will be planning level cost estimates that include the replacement of individual services and reconstruction of the roadway as appropriate.

#### **PROFESSIONAL STAFF**

**Leonard L. Smith, PE/PLS** will serve as the Principal in Charge and Project Manager for all work associated with the Nestle Reimbursement Agreement for the City of Black Diamond. He will oversee the preparation of all planning and technical work and will serve as the lead in the development of the recommendations. Mr. Smith will participate in all meetings and presentations to the City of Black Diamond and the Council and serve as the primary point of contact for the City.

**Christine J. Smith, PE** will assist Mr. Smith in the evaluation of the impacts that the Nestle Water Bottling plant may have on the City of Black Diamond's water system. Ms. Smith will also complete any necessary water system modeling.

#### **BUDGET**

PacWest Engineering proposes to complete the work as outlined in this proposal on an hourly basis, not to exceed \$14,690 as detailed on the attached spreadsheet.

#### **SCHEDULE**

PacWest Engineering will begin work immediately upon receiving signed authorization from the City. PacWest Engineering will dedicate the required staff to ensure the project proceeds in a timely manner and achieves the client's goals. PacWest Engineering is committed to respond to the needs of the project throughout the project's life.

PacWest Engineering understands that the City is extending the reimbursement agreement with Nestle through the end of June 2009 and that it is the City's intention that all work covered under this scope of services will be completed prior to that date.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BLACK DIAMOND, WASHINGTON, DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute a Reimbursement Agreement with Nestlé Waters North America for consultant costs associated with feasibility exploration.

## REIMBURSEMENT AGREEMENT

This Reimbursement Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into between the City of Black Diamond, a municipal corporation of the State of Washington (hereinafter "City") and Nestlé Waters North America, Inc. (hereinafter "NWNA").

#### RECITALS

- A. NWNA is investigating the possibility of entering into an agreement with the City to become a customer of the City for spring water to supply a bottling facility located within the City's limits ("Facility"); and
- B. In order to further their investigation, NWNA desires to enter into discussions with the City, its staff and its consultants to aid both parties in determining the feasibility of a Facility; and
- C. The City desires to enter discussions and assess with NWNA the feasibility of a Facility, but requires the assistance of its own legal, engineering and other consultants to meaningfully participate in such discussions; and
- D. Both parties acknowledge and agree that the reasonable costs incurred by the City to participate in discussions and assessment with NWNA regarding the feasibility of a Facility should be borne by NWNA as provided below.

Now, therefore, for the mutual considerations set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The City agrees to engage in good faith discussions with NWNA for the purpose of determining the feasibility of a Facility. Determining the feasibility of a Facility shall mean assessing and identifying the availability of and impact upon water rights and resources available to the City, particularly spring water, the impact upon future water availability, the economic benefits to the community and the water utility, consistency with the comprehensive plan and land use regulations, and other matters that relate to the capability and suitability of accommodating the needs of the Facility and the City. Entering into this agreement is not intended to be a commitment by the City that it will enter into an agreement to sell any of its water to NWNA, or to allow NWNA facilities to be located on City property; nor is it intended to be a commitment by NWNA that it will locate a facility in the City, or agree to purchase water from the City, regardless of the outcome of the feasibility analysis.
- 2. NWNA agrees to reimburse the City for certain outside consultant and legal expenses and City staff costs ("Reimbursable Costs") incurred by the City in supporting discussions regarding the feasibility of a Facility, up to a maximum amount of \$25,000.00. For the purpose of this agreement, "City staff costs" includes only those costs incurred by outside consultants serving as members of the City staff, such as the City Attorney and City Engineer, and not those costs incurred by salaried City employees. Reimbursable Costs are the reasonable

costs incurred by the City, its staff and its consultants in supporting discussions regarding the feasibility of a Facility and reviewing this agreement, the right of entry agreement, and any subsequent agreements between the parties. In the event the Reimbursable Costs exceed \$25,000.00, the City may request NWNA to reimburse those costs. Approval of those additional Reimbursable Costs will be made following a reasonableness review of the costs; provided that, the City will have no obligation under this agreement to continue incurring costs that NWNA does not agree to reimburse.

- 3. The City will provide monthly invoices to NWNA for the Reimbursable Costs incurred by the City in the prior month. NWNA will remit payment of the Reimbursable Costs within 45 days of receipt of the City's invoice. In the event NWNA disagrees with any item on the City's invoice, NWNA's representative or his designee shall contact the City Administrator to attempt informal resolution of the disagreement.
- 4. This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington. The venue for any lawsuit to enforce any provision of this agreement shall be King County, Washington.
- 5. This Agreement may be terminated by either party with 30 days advance notice to the other party. NWNA shall remain responsible for all Reimbursable Costs incurred by the City prior to the termination date. This Agreement may only be amended by the written mutual assent of the Parties. Unless extended by written mutual consent of both parties, this Agreement shall expire no later than January 1, 2009. Upon expiration or receipt of notice of termination by NWNA or issuance of Notice of Termination by the City, NWNA will be responsible for only those Reimbursable Costs incurred by the City up to the date of expiration or receipt of Notice of Intent to Terminate.

Notice given hereunder shall be in writing and shall be deemed effective either, (i) upon hand delivery to the person then holding the office shown on the attention line of the address below, or, if such office is vacant or no longer exists, to a person holding a comparable office, or (ii) when delivered by a nationally recognized overnight mail delivery service, to the Party and at the address specified below, or (iii) on the third business day following its deposit with the United States Postal Service, first class and certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, properly sealed and addressed as follows:

- 6. NWNA acknowledges that its rights under this Agreement are limited and that the City has not made any representation or warranty with respect to NWNA's ability to obtain any permit or regulatory approval, to obtain a water service agreement, or to meet any other legal requirements for development of the Facility. Nothing in this Agreement is intended or shall be construed to require that the City exercise its discretionary authority under its regulatory ordinances or its legislative authority to further the Facility nor binds the City to do so. NWNA understands that the City will process applications for permits and approvals in accordance with its normal processes and that the sole purpose of this Agreement is to provide for reimbursement to the City for its reasonable costs associated with participating with NWNA in determining the feasibility of the Project.
- 7. <u>No Joint Venture</u>. It is not intended by this Agreement to create any partnership, joint venture, or principal-agent relationship or other arrangement between NWNA and the City. Neither Party is authorized to, nor shall either Party act toward third Persons or the public in any manner which would indicate any such relationship with the other.
