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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, City operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Black Diamond from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2016.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the City's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2016 and 2015, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Accounts payable and general disbursements
- Compliance with the Open Public Meetings Act
- Budget compliance
- Use of restricted funds – real estate excise tax
- Developer agreements
- Procurement of professional services
- Citizen concerns related to each area noted above
- Payroll – gross wages and benefits

INFORMATION ABOUT THE CITY

The City of Black Diamond, incorporated in 1959, is classified as a non-charter code City located in King County. The City provides its approximately 4,360 residents with police, fire, water, sewer, stormwater, streets, public works, community development, parks, cemetery and Municipal Court services. The City of Black Diamond is a strong (elected) Mayor code city. The Mayor shall be the chief executive (RCW 35A.12.100) and administrative officer of the City, in charge of all departments and its 28 employees.

The elected, five-member City Council is the legislative arm of the government and makes policy in the form of passing ordinances or resolutions. For fiscal years 2015 and 2016, the City reported expenditures of approximately \$7.3 million and \$7.7 million, respectively.
