The City has received public comments and complaints about the mooring of unoccupied boats, overnight mooring and people living on boats. The overall

concern is for public safety as well as potential pollutants into Lake Sawyer from such

Additionally, BDMC Chapter 8.24.220 contains regulations to maintain safety from the public use and enjoyment on Lake Sawyer.

3) Environmental Overview

Currently, there are two large boats on Lake Sawyer that have been mooring overnight, leaving the boats unattended during the week and living on them during the weekend. The Lake is a site for many types of recreation; fishing, boating, skiing, and swimming. The unattended boats have drifted into the active, recreational areas and may have harmed other people recreating on the Lake. Lake Sawyer is not equipped or intended for overnight use; there are no public mooring buoys or dump stations nearby. There is a strong possibility that the continuation of such uses will cause harm or introduce pollutants into the Lake.

A SEPA DNS was prepared for the SMP. Black Diamond was lead agency and documents may be viewed by contacting the City of Black Diamond Community Development Department. The SMP contains policies to maintain the public use of Lake Sawyer and specifically does not allowing mooring buoys on the Lake.

The proposed non-project action, an Ordinance to prohibit overnight or unattended moorage for extended periods of time and people living on boats is consistent with the city's policies, regulations and state and federal laws.

Lake Sawyer is a large lake that is under the jurisdiction of the Shoreline Management Act (SMA). The lake is largely developed with single family homes and private docks.

There is one public boat launch and a public park that provides public access and allows for the use and enjoyment of the lake both residents and non-residents.

Due to the crowded conditions, the lake is heavily used for many types of recreation; including fishing, swimming, and boating. The proposed non-project action will have no negative impact on the elements of the environment listed in WAC 197-11-444. It is the intent of the ordinance to improve existing conditions by prohibiting uses on the lake that may impact environmental health as well as to create an additional environmental impact from boats that are unattended and my be leaking fuel into the water or discharging illicit waste. In addition to causing harm to the natural and built environments, public services are increased if a spill is reported or someone is injured from an unattended, moored boat coming untied or drifting into active boating areas.
